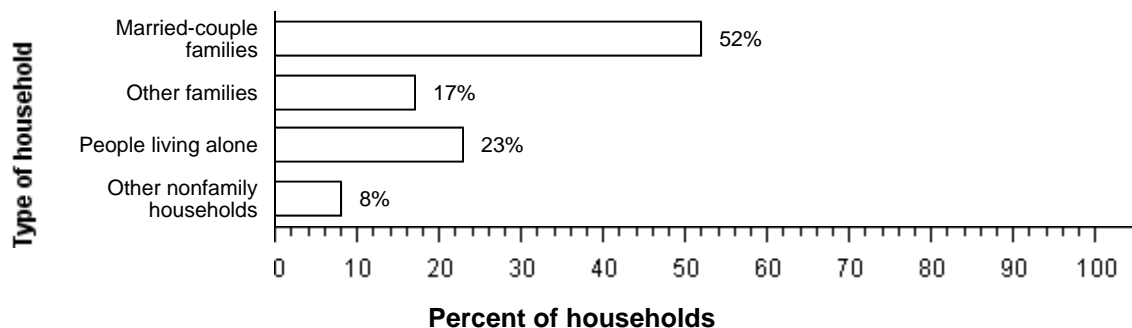

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2006 there were 40,000 households in Boone County. The average household size was 2.7 people.

Families made up 69 percent of the households in Boone County. This figure includes both married-couple families (52 percent) and other families (17 percent). Nonfamily households made up 31 percent of all households in Boone County. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Boone County, Kentucky in 2006

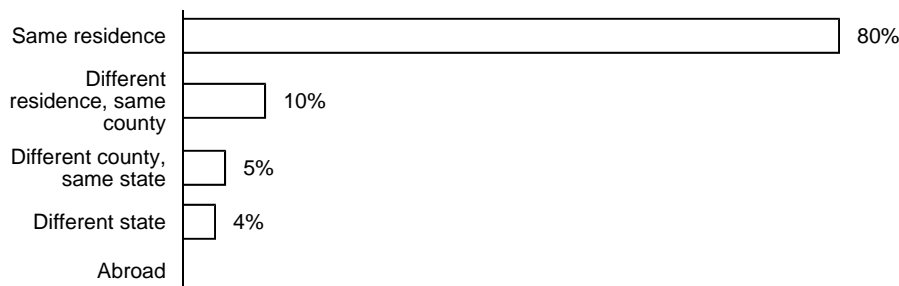


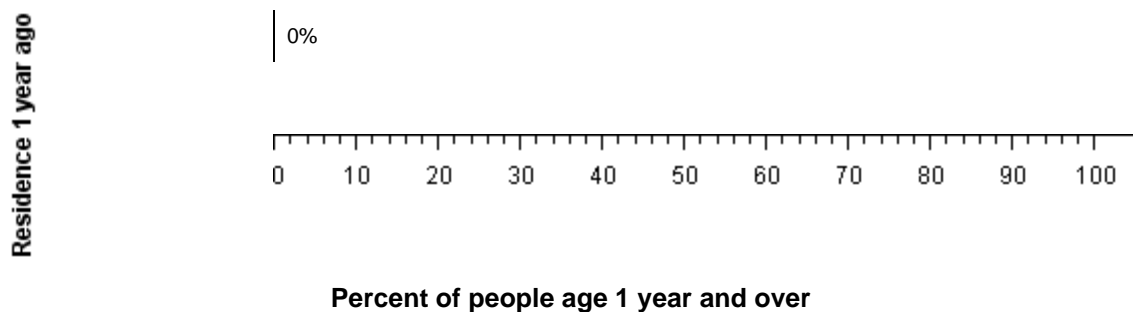

NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Data for this section cannot be displayed because the number of sample cases is too small. Displaying the data would risk disclosing information for individuals.

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2006, 80 percent of the people at least one year old living in Boone County were living in the same residence one year earlier; 10 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 5 percent from another county in the same state, 4 percent from another state, and less than 0.5 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Boone County, Kentucky in 2006



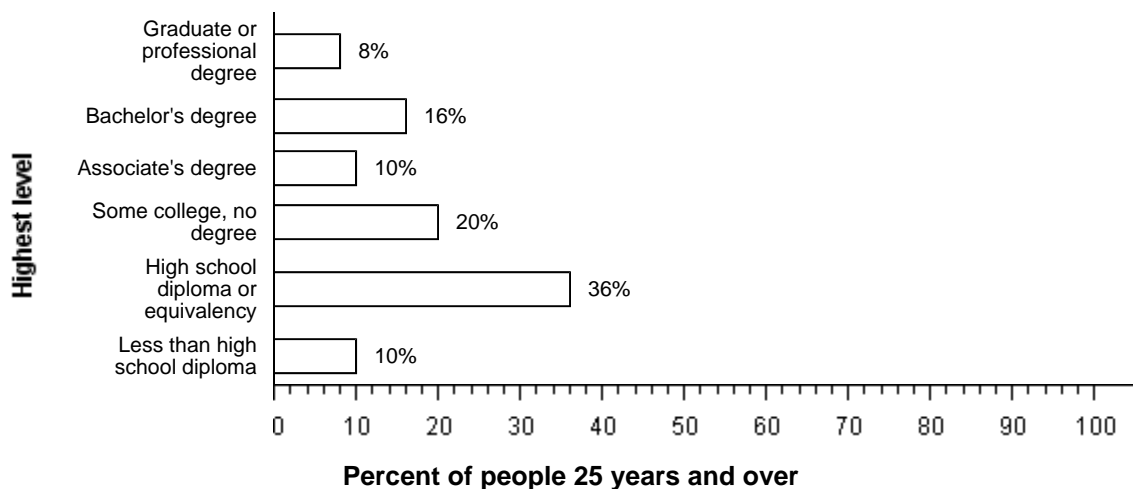

EDUCATION: In 2006, 90 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 25 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Ten percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Boone County was 29,000 in 2006. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 4,100 and elementary or high school enrollment was 19,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 6,800.

The Educational Attainment of People in Boone County, Kentucky in 2006

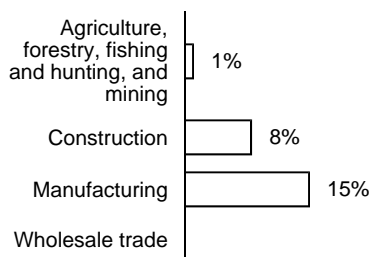


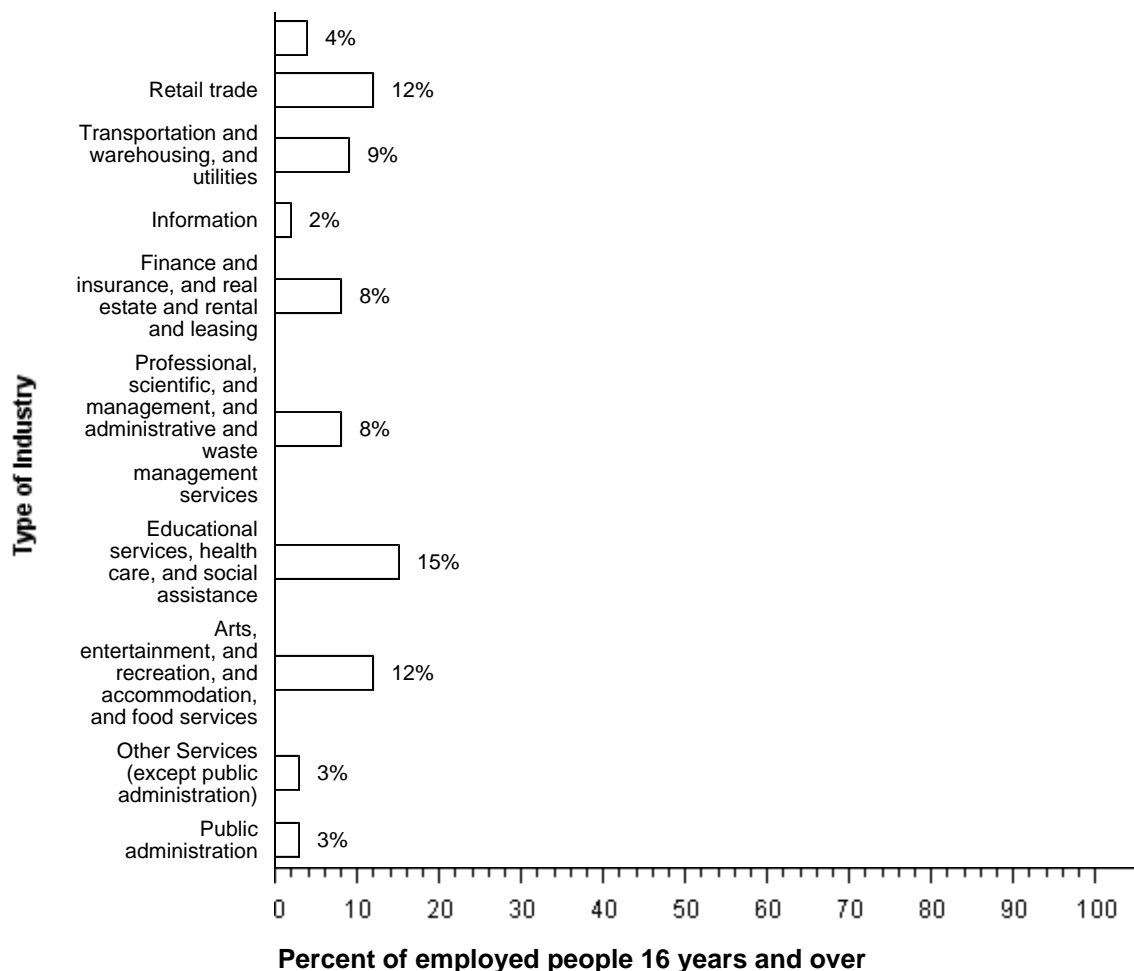

DISABILITY: In Boone County, among people at least five years old in 2006, 13 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 9 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 10 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 39 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2006, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Boone County were Manufacturing, 15 percent, and Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 15 percent.

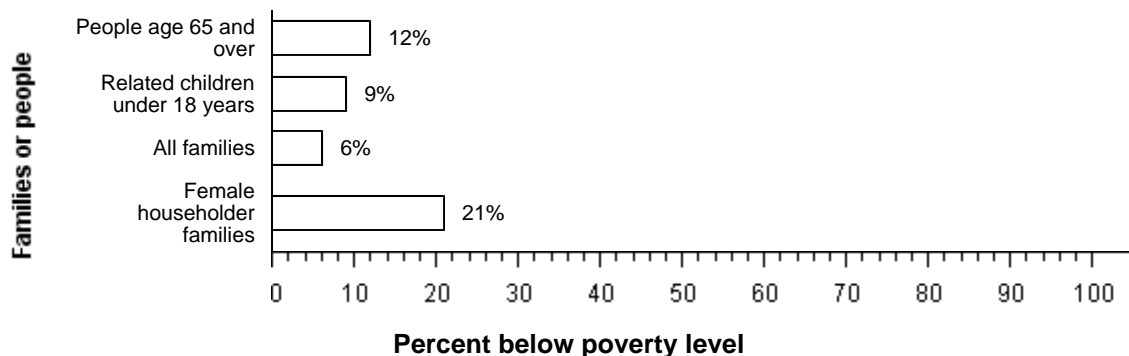
OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Sales and office occupations, 31 percent; Management, professional, and related occupations, 30 percent; Service occupations, 15 percent; Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 13 percent; and Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 11 percent. Eighty-six percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 8 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 5 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

TRAVEL TO WORK: Eighty-six percent of Boone County workers drove to work alone in 2006, 9 percent carpooled, 1 percent took public transportation, and 2 percent used other means. The remaining 2 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 23.1 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Boone County was \$56,477. Eighty-eight percent of the households received earnings and 15 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Eighteen percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$13,932. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2006, 8 percent of people were in poverty. Nine percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 12 percent of people 65 years old and over. Six percent of all families and 21 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.

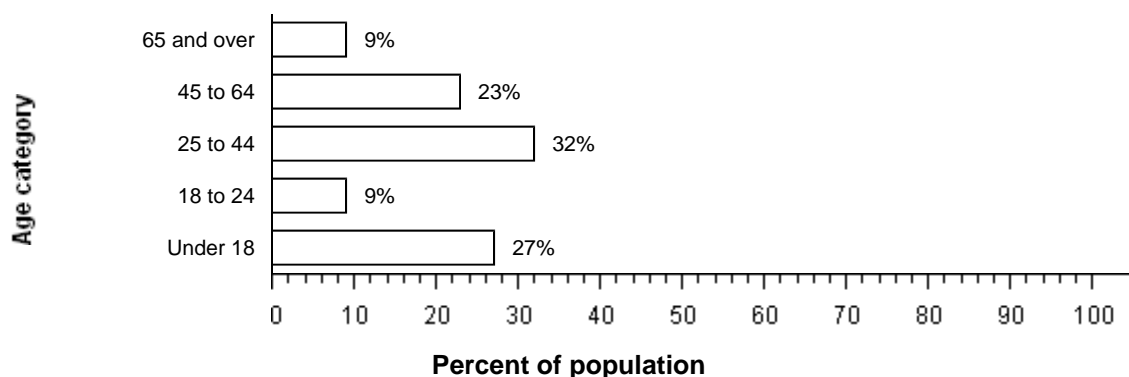
Poverty Rates in Boone County, Kentucky in 2006

POPULATION OF Boone County: In 2006, Boone County had a total population of 110,000 - 56,000 (50 percent) females and 55,000 (50 percent) males. The median age was 33 years. Twenty-seven percent of the population was under 18 years and 9 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in Boone County, Kentucky in 2006

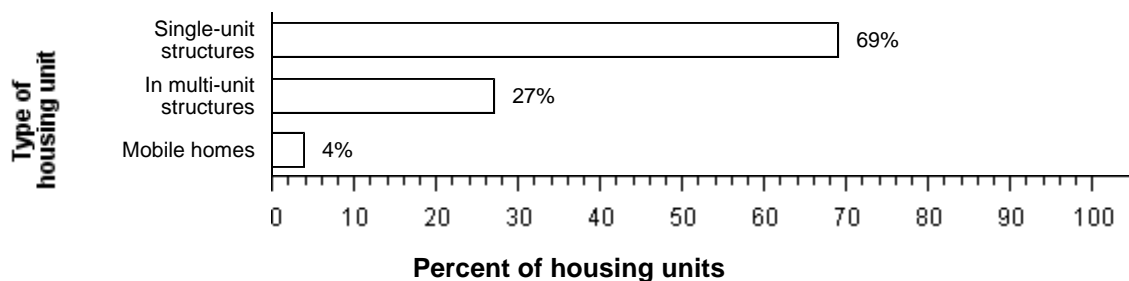

For people reporting one race alone, 94 percent was White; 3 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 2 percent was Asian; less than 0.5 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 1 percent was Some other race. One percent reported Two or more races. Three percent of the people in Boone County was Hispanic. Ninety-two percent of the people in Boone County was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Boone County had a total of 43,000 housing units, 7 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 69 percent was in single-unit structures, 27 percent was in multi-unit structures, and 4 percent was mobile homes. Fifty-five percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

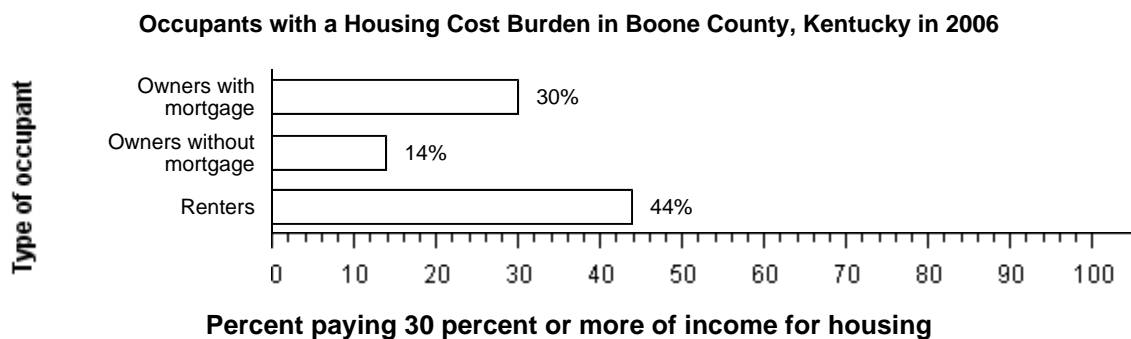
The Types of Housing Units in Boone County, Kentucky in 2006

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Boone County had 40,000 occupied housing units - 29,000 (72 percent) owner occupied and 11,000 (28 percent) renter occupied. Eleven percent of the households did not have telephone service and 4 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Forty-two percent had two vehicles and another 24 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$1,356, nonmortgaged owners \$374, and renters \$683. Thirty percent of owners with mortgages, 14 percent of owners without mortgages, and 44 percent of renters in Boone County spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.

Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. The degree of uncertainty for an estimate arising from sampling variability is represented through the use of a margin of error. The value shown here is the 90 percent margin of error. The margin of error can be interpreted roughly as providing a 90 percent probability that the interval defined by the estimate minus the margin of error and the estimate plus the margin of error (the lower and upper confidence bounds) contains the true value. In addition to sampling variability, the ACS estimates are subject to nonsampling error (for a discussion of nonsampling variability, see [Accuracy of the Data](#)). The effect of nonsampling error is not represented in these tables.

Notes:

·Ancestry listed in this table refers to the total number of people who responded with a particular ancestry; for example, the estimate given for Russian represents the number of people who listed Russian as either their first or second ancestry. This table lists only the largest ancestry groups; see the Detailed Tables for more categories. Race and Hispanic origin groups are not included in this table because official data for those groups come from the Race and Hispanic origin questions rather than the ancestry question (see Demographic Table).
